CCAC COURT REPORTING

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CCAC's Court Reporting program teaches students the skills they need to be workforce ready—machine shorthand, medical and legal terminology and computer-aided transcription.

Graduates have gone on to work with governmental agencies, in health care and even with Pittsburgh sports teams. Nearly 100 % of our students receive job offers before graduation. Court reporters create verbatim transcripts of speeches, conversations, legal proceedings, meetings and other events. They play a critical role at every event where the spoken word must be preserved and are responsible for producing a complete, accurate and secure legal record. Increasingly, court reporters provide realtime translating services to the deaf and hard-of-hearing community.

Graduates of CCAC's Court Reporting program can work as judicial reporters, freelance reporters, broadcast captioners or in college and university settings as Communications Access Realtime Translation (CART) reporters. Many work for VITAC, providing realtime closed-captioning for television programs. Students interested in court reporting can choose from either the certificate or associate degree program. Both programs offer instruction using state-of-theart technology. A captioning laboratory and practice classroom enhance the educational experience. Both programs begin in the fall, and all classes are held during the day at CCAC's Allegheny Campus on the North Shore. Students have the option of full-time or part-time enrollment.
